

AUTHORIZATION TO EXECUTE A SOLE-SOURCE CONTRACT FOR WABTEC CLOUD PTC HOSTING AND WABTECONE™ PTC PERFORMANCE ANALYTICS

Recommendation:

The VRE Operations Board is asked to authorize the CEO to execute a sole-source contract with Wabtec Corporation of Cedar Rapids, Iowa for Cloud Positive Train Control (PTC) Hosting and WabtecOne™ PTC Performance Analytics in the amount of \$4,454,930, plus a 10 percent contingency of \$445,493, for a total amount not to exceed \$4,900,423, for a five-year term.

Summary:

VRE's current contract for hosted back-office services for PTC will expire in September 2023. Wabtec Corporation offers a cloud-based back-office solution that incorporates WabtecOne™ performance analytics. WabtecOne™ is a complete turnkey hosted back-office solution for I-ETMS-based PTC systems, complete with both onboard and office software. An important component of the turnkey system is the One Help Desk, which provides a single point of contact to answer questions, troubleshoot and to find solutions for issues within the PTC system.

AUTHORIZATION TO EXECUTE A CONTRACT FOR SECURITY CAMERA INSTALLATION

Recommendation:

The VRE Operations Board is asked to authorize the CEO to execute a contract with Genesys Impact, LLC of Washington, DC for security camera installation in the amount of \$494,769, plus a 10 percent contingency of \$49,477, for a total amount not to exceed \$544,246.

Summary:

The VRE Operations Board previously authorized the purchase of security camera equipment for use at VRE's stations. The proposed contract will allow VRE to continue the effort of modernizing its security camera system through installation of the cameras previously acquired under a separate contract and will also achieve the goal of standardizing the security camera equipment at each of VRE's station locations. Additionally, this contract will enable VRE to acquire some additional equipment to augment VRE's security camera inventory.

FISCALYEAR 2025 BUDGET KEY ISSUES

Summary

- October/November 2023: Budget updates and discussion as needed
- <u>December 2023</u>: Recommended Budget presented to Board for referral to Commissions
- January 2024: Commissions adopt budget and forward to jurisdictions
- **Spring 2024:** Individual jurisdictional budget processes and appropriation of VRE subsidy



STAFFING

- New facilities (e.g., LOU, Potomac Shores station, expanded parking)
- Safety and security, regulatory compliance, etc.
- Financially responsible operations
- Cost savings vs. contracting out of critical work

INFLATION & COST GROWTH

- Operating costs are driven by <u>service levels</u>, not by ridership
- Major contracts linked to inflation indices:
 - Consumer Price Index
 - Association of American Railroads (AAR) Index
 - Passenger Rail Investment and Improvement Act of 2008 (PRIIA) cost-sharing model drives access fees at Washington Union Station
- Suppliers adjusting prices regularly due to inflation, supply chain issues and more, with limited suppliers in passenger rail industry
- Material costs (ex. steel) affected by global economic factors

JURISDICTIONAL SUBSIDY



















- FY21 subsidy of \$18.3 million (21% of operating budget)
- Reduced to \$4.8 million in FY22 (6% of operating budget),
 backfilled with pandemic relief funds (CARES Act)
- Increased to \$13.5 million in FY23 and \$16.0 million in FY24
- As ridership continues to recover:
 - ✓ Jurisdictional allocation of subsidy is also changing
 - ✓ Every dollar not earned in fare revenue or provided by jurisdictional or state subsidy requires another dollar of pandemic relief funds







PANDEMIC RELIEF FUNDS

- Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act
- \$86.1 million fully utilized as of Q1 of FY 2023
- American Rescue Plan (ARP) Act
- \$118.7 million currently being utilized, with approximately \$13.1 million drawn through the end of FY 2023
- \$31.8 million of ARP funds budgeted to be utilized in FY 2024
- Coronavirus Response and Relief Supplemental Appropriations Act (CRRSAA)
- \$70.1 million available to VRE after ARPA is utilized

All relief funds have been fully obligated

SPENDING AUTHORITY REPORT

On September 18, 2020, the VRE Operations Board approved increasing the CEO's delegated spending authority from \$100,000 to \$200,000. It was resolved as part of that increased delegation that any purchase or contract award in the range of \$50,000 to \$200,000 would be communicated to the Board as an information item.

- On June 14, 2023, VRE issued a task order in the amount of \$107,136 to Hill International, Inc. under the program management consulting services contract to complete an evaluation of the cost and schedule estimating approaches and methodologies VRE currently utilizes to gauge efficiency, reliability, and predictability of project cost and project delivery time.
- On June 20, 2023, VRE issued a task order in an amount not to exceed \$200,000 to Siddall Communications, Inc. to provide direct advertising and support for VRE marketing campaigns on an as-needed basis, including photography and videography services, media buying, development of social media campaigns, and graphic design services. This task order was issued by utilizing the cooperative purchasing provision of the existing contract between Siddall and DRPT for general communications and marketing consultant services.
- On June 29, 2023, VRE issued a task order in the amount of \$198,000 to Keolis Rail Services Virginia, LLC under the maintenance services for commuter rail contract for the replacement of passenger railcar carbody signage.

- On June 29, 2023, VRE issued a task order in an amount not to exceed \$177,580 to Keolis Rail Services Virginia, LLC under the maintenance services for commuter rail contract to complete repairs on an as-needed basis to the track at the Crossroads and Broad Run Maintenance and Storage facilities during FY 24.
- On June 29, 2023, VRE issued a task order in an amount not to exceed \$115,500 to Keolis Rail Services Virginia, LLC under the maintenance services for commuter rail contract to replace ties on an as-needed basis at the Crossroads and Broad Run Maintenance and Storage facilities during FY 24.
